Most Able Trip: Amnesty International Children's Rights Conference

A little while ago, a group of most able students set off to London for a conference held by Amnesty International. A conference included discussion and debate, as well as workshops on how to advocate for our rights. We talked about the voting age, climate change, online safety and much more. Amnesty International and their invited speakers were massively encouraging and supportive of deliberation and conversation about what should change, what needs to change and what might change.

We had talks from multiple protesters of our age (and younger!) about what they believed in and what they thought was right and wrong. Their main point overall was that they believed that as an age group of `young people` we deserved a say in what goes on in the world. It was amazingly powerful to hear something like that said aloud with so much agreement in the room. Everyone at the conference strongly believed that children more than anyone deserve a say in what goes on in the world. Especially as it is our generation that will be affected by the choices that adults make.

Throughout the day we split off in groups to different talks depending on what we were most interested in. I went to one about whether we should abolish the voting age. As young people we don't often have a lot of knowledge about politics or how it affects people's lives but usually we want to strive to know more. We discussed in this talk, many different aspects of voting and what might be required if younger generations were to have the right to vote. Many people believe that we as young people don't may not make sensible decisions but the same may apply for adults. Many examples were mentioned such as, how many of the same arguments applied to why the youth shouldn't vote was once applied to why women shouldn't vote and by the end of the far too short debate we were left with many different ideas and points to go and think about.

Some talks were more about the safety of children. One talk discussed age limits of apps and security measures. Many people lie about their age to get onto apps that may not be appropriate for them. Companies have been pulled up for this and say that it can be fixed by new face recognition technology. In the talk, we discussed this and whether it was good idea or not. After much debating we concluded that there are far more downsides to this technology than there are upsides.

There were so many different talks that many different people went to, that all had the same idea that young people should be allowed the make their point far more often than they do. The talks showed me that more than anything. Young people have so many interesting ideas and beliefs that should be listened to more. So many adults turn their heads to younger people thinking that we don't know what we are talking about. We do and should be allowed to share it to the world. That was the main idea of the day for me, and I will take that with me in the future.

Graphical Organisers - Computer Science

During the teacher training day on 9th January one of the focus areas was the usefulness of graphical organisers to aid with student knowledge and understanding.

A graphical organiser is a mechanism whereby students can link key concepts, dates, and other knowledge together in a diagrammatical format which helps them visualise hierarchy and cause/effect.

Year 10 Computer Science students have been starting to put these to good use as part of a consolidation lesson on the role of memory and the CPU in computing functions.

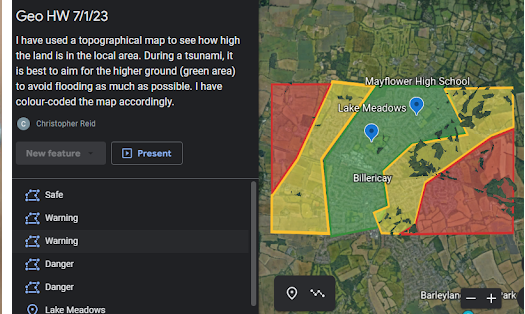
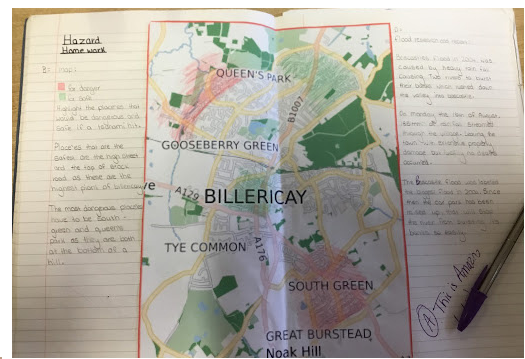

Geography Curriculum Update

For the Hazards unit, Year 9 have been able to choose the homework they complete from a 'Hazards Takeaway Menu'. Many have chosen to produce models representing the structure of the Earth using various mediums. Others have chosen to write songs or poems or have produced collages of various hazards they have researched. Other students selected to consider the local area and identify areas that would be impacted if a tsunami were to hit. There have been some outstanding pieces of work mapping the potential impacted areas by hand and digitally using GIS, identifying safe and unsafe locations. Here are some examples of the excellent pieces of work they have produced.



Year 8 students have been studying Russia, where they have looked at the country's physical and human geography, including how challenging it is to live in the tundra. For homework they have researched traditional Russian food. Some examples are shown below:-



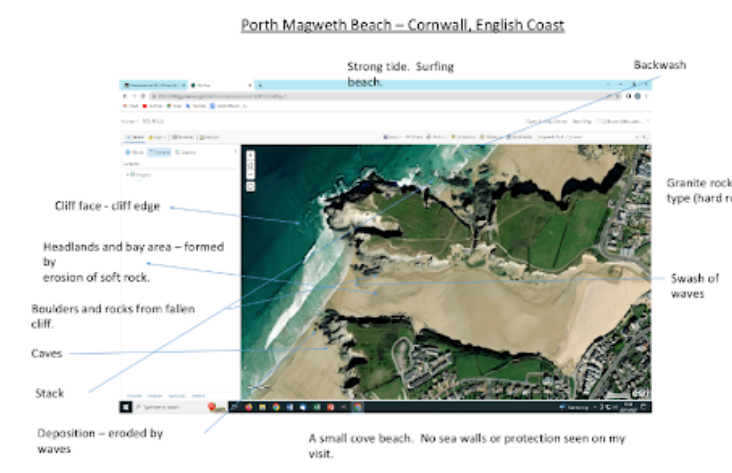
Pirozhki are little baked or fried puff pastries that are packed full of potatoes, meat, cabbage, or cheese. It is a very popular snack in Russian schools and factories.



Peimani are dumplings, traditionally filled with pork, lamb and beef, usually served with sour cream. Many people debate about the origins of this dish as different countries around the world have their own adaptations of it. Like the Uzbek manti, and Georgian khinkali, and Jewish kreplah, or Chinese xiaolongbao. In many families it's a family tradition to sculpt dumplings together.

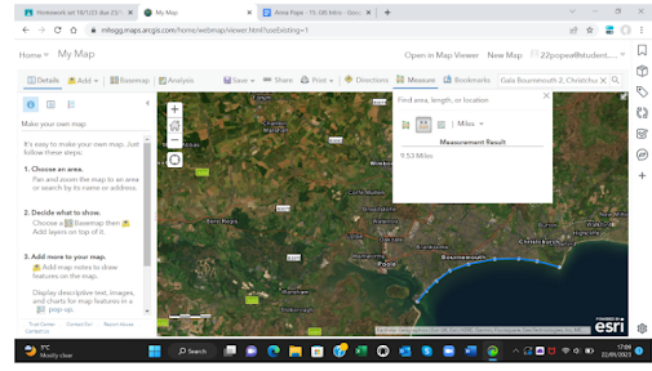


Year 7 have been introduced to GIS (Geographic Information Systems) in lessons and have used ArcGIS to investigate locations. For their homework within the Coasts unit, some students have had the opportunity to impress their teachers with their GIS skills. Here are some pieces of homework from 7M1 and 7F2 that really did impress!



Bournemouth Beach, United Kingdom

Measures 9.5 miles long from Sandbanks to Boscombe

Year 10 students are currently studying the UK in the 21st Century unit. Here they looked at some of the recently released outcomes of the 2021 census, have considered the impact of the UK's ageing population and the attempts to reduce its negative impacts. In addition they have looked at changing work patterns including the impact of COVID.

Year 11 students are now studying the very topical unit of Climate Change. They have considered the reliability of evidence of climate change including ice cores from Antarctica and paintings from the 17th century. They are beginning to identify the synoptic links between units already studied including how climate change can be linked to recent extreme weather events such as last summer's heat waves and the impact that this had across the UK.

Year 12 have been writing up their investigation following their fieldwork in Stratford. The focus of their investigation was the enquiry question 'To what extent has rebranding in East London been successful?' They visited various locations in Stratford to help them investigate the question including the Olympic Park and Velodrome.



In addition they have begun the debates unit 'Hazardous Earth' where they have considered the various theories of continental drift and plate tectonics. Going beyond the ideas of palaeomagnetism and sea-floor spreading to consider the more recent theory of ridge-push, slab pull.

Year 13 have finished their NEA, worth 20% of their A level. Following a visit to Southwold last summer they chose to investigate a variety of enquiry questions including:- 'To what extent has Adnams shaped Southwold's identity?', 'To what extent has the change of Southwold's High Street over time affected its place identity?' and 'Have the management strategies implemented within Southwold had a positive impact on its beaches?'. In lessons Year 13 have nearly completed the Global Migration unit where they have studied the complexities of migration brought about by changes to national immigration and emigration policies. They have focused on Brazil, an emerging and developing country, looking at its interdependence with Portugal, USA and Haiti.

Camp International

Our 45 students who are beginning to fundraise money for their 4 week trip of a lifetime to Costa Rica are now in receipt of their T. Shirts from Camps International. This will help raise the awareness of their fundraising activities. So far we have bake sales, go fund me pages, making crafts to sell, Etsy shops and quiz nights planned as well as a whole range of other activities.

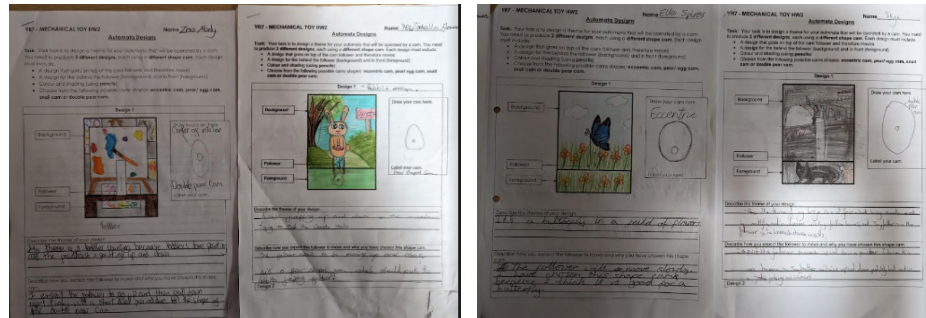

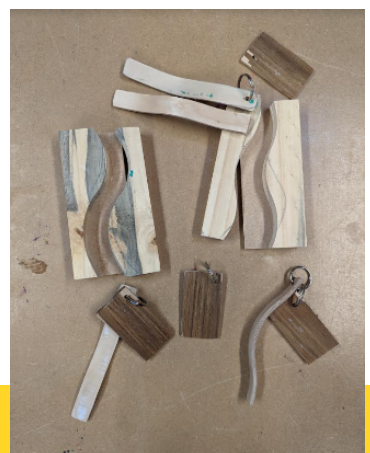

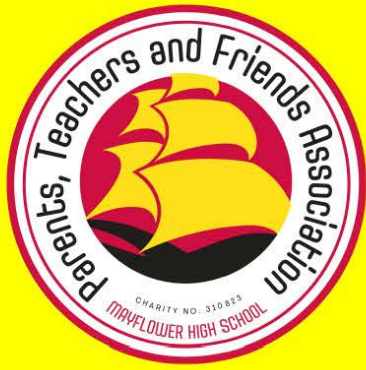
