History GCSE Berlin Trip

For the first time since 2019, we were very pleased to be once again descending on Berlin as part of our GCSE Berlin trip. With nearly 100 Year 10 and Year 11 students in tow, we spent four History filled days in Berlin at the start of the Easter holidays!

After a 2.15am start at school, we departed from Heathrow airport. Once we arrived in Berlin, we were met by our tour guides for a walking tour of the city. The students were shown the Reichstag, Brandenburg Gate, The Memorial to the Murdered Jews of Europe site and remaining parts of the Berlin Wall. Whilst walking around the city, the students were shown stumbling stones commemorating the lost Jewish citizens from local communities. It was fascinating to see historical artifacts on nearly every street we visited.

On the following days, we visited a range of other historical sites across the city. We continued our trip by visiting the Topography of Terror, a museum on the site of the former SS group, which also housed Gestapo jail cells. This museum showed the students a timeline of how the persecution of minority groups grew from 1933 onwards. This visit helped to put into context the effects of these laws, leading to the creation of concentration camps such as Sachenhausen. At the site of the former concentration camp, students were given the opportunity to explore the site as small groups. With the aid of audio guides, the students were able to see for themselves where many minority groups were imprisoned during the Nazi regime. It was a very moving visit for all of us.

Prior to the Sachsenhausen visit, the students also were able to visit Wannsee. This was the site of the signing of the Final Solution, the plan in 1942 to accelerate the killing of minority groups across Europe. Being in the room where decisions of this magnitude were made was an emotive moment for many of our students. We also visited the Jewish Museum and explored the Reichstag building, home to the German Parliament.

A trip of this size takes many, many months to plan. Special thanks go to Mrs Cumber, who ensured that the trip was organised and planned with great detail. The students were extremely grateful for the opportunity to visit Berlin and behaved brilliantly throughout the four days abroad. We look forward to our next GCSE trip to Berlin, taking place in 2025!

Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme - 2023 Bronze Award

There has been an enthusiastic response to Mayflowers 'Duke of Edinburgh' Bronze award scheme with 73 Year 10 students having signed up and making good progress towards achieving their award.

The students are all undertaking their Bronze award which comprises four sections, skill, physical, volunteering and expedition.



This year's scheme is being run slightly differently with the school working closely with a recommended outsource expedition provider 'East Coast Outdoors'.

The registered students have already begun their chosen Skill, Volunteering and Physical activities and many attended the successful and informative expedition open evening before the end of spring term.

The scheme is being championed by Mr R Griffiths and two of his staff, Ms Walter and Mr Harris with part time help from Mrs Spooner an experienced DofE co-ordinator, leader, assessor and expedition advisor.

The team host a drop-in session every Tuesday P4a for guidance, advice and progress updates to the present and past Mayflower DofE candidates. With expeditions planned for June (training) and September (assessment), we are looking forward to all students achieving their Bronze award in the autumn term this year.

English and British Championships for Gymnastics

In March one of our Year 10 students, Maggie Shepherd, traveled to Liverpool to compete in the English and British Championships for Gymnastics. She placed 13th best in England for her all-around competition.

Maggie said that "I have also now moved up into the senior category meaning I am up against some of the best gymnasts in the country. I'm very pleased with my performance and excited to see what the next season holds."

Eco Trip - Wales

During the first week of the Easter holidays, 37 Mayflower students attended the Eco Trip to Pembrokeshire.

Students were given the opportunity to explore one of the most incredible coastlines in St David's, where they were able to take part in coasteering, surfing, boat trips and coastal walks. Students were also given an immersive insight into some of the global issues being debated called by conservations and sustainability.

We were fortunate enough to visit Dr Beynon's Bug Farm, where students were able to handle various insects, learn about sustainable bug farming and even try some insects in the farms 'Grub Kitchen', most students tried the tasters on offer including big burgers and cricket cookies.

Towards the end of week, students explored Ramsey Island via a boat safari where we learnt about whales, dolphins, seals, birds and porpoises and were lucky enough to spot several seals and porpoises during the trip.

Students took part in various different workshops focused on sustainability, including a fantastic insight into the importance of kelp forests and coastal ecosystems, and their impact on climate change. Students were able to learn about different types of seaweed and try some carrot cake and seaweed cupcakes, which were delicious!

Staying at the incredible St David's Bunkbarns, students were given a home from home with comfortable accommodation and delicious food. They were also able to spend free time playing football, taking part in yoga sessions, morning runs, keeping warm by the fire pit and enjoying movie night.
