LGBT+ History Month and History Club

LGBT+ History Month is celebrated in the UK in February each year. It started as an initiative on marking the abolition of Section 28.

Section 28 was part of the Local Government Act 1988, which stated that a local authority:

- "shall not intentionally promote homosexuality or publish material with the intention of promoting homosexuality"
- "promote the teaching in any maintained school of the acceptability of homosexuality as a pretended family relationship "

The effect of this was teachers and other school staff became fearful of doing what they knew and felt to be the right thing. This fear was further aggravated by some sections of society and the media misrepresenting the LGBT+ community.

Students in school, who identified with the LGBT+ community, felt consistently isolated and alienated from the 'norm'. Section 28 prohibited them from seeing any of the LGBT+ community reflected in their education or the world around them.

Despite Section 28 having been abolished in 2003, education still needs to continue to strive to ensure diversity and positivity of the LGBT+ community can be found in our curriculums. Instead of feeling isolated and alienated, they are able to see themselves reflected in their curriculum and the freedom to explore who they are.

This year's theme pays homage to the people 'behind the lens', which gives us the opportunity to celebrate the lives of the LGBT+ community who have contributed to the fields of photography, film and fashion.

Over the course of February, History Club will explore some of these industries. We will look at positive individuals, such as Kay Tobin, as well as laws that have negatively affected the community, like New York's Masquerade Laws.

As a club we hope to use this month as an opportunity to engage with the all too hidden history of the LGBT+ community.




A Level Biologist




















Design & Technology

These are some of the first to have been made. Well done to:Liza Podsvirova, Lily Norman, Alfie Millen and Zack Briggs




