16-19 Bursary Fund Policy 2019-20

What is the 16-19 Bursary Fund?

The 16-19 Bursary Fund helps 16-19 year olds continue in education, where they might otherwise struggle for financial reasons. It is made up of two parts – bursaries of £1200 a year to the most vulnerable young people and a discretionary fund for schools, colleges, academies, training providers and local authorities (providers) to distribute.

The fund is a fixed and finite sum and allocations may therefore not exceed the total sum available.

It should be noted that awards are annual or for the remainder of the academic year unless there is a change to personal circumstances or the criteria under which you are applying.

Students who are concerned about the costs associated with university research should contact the universities in the first instance to ascertain whether there is funding available. Once this has been determined and if financial assistance is still required, it is possible to submit a request to be considered by the Bursary Remissions Panel during the Summer Term.

Who is eligible to apply for 16-19 Bursary Funding?

Students following government funded full time or part-time courses, who are 16 years and over and satisfy one or more of the following criteria:-

Students aged at least 16 and under 19 years of age on 31/08/19 who are in care, are leaving care, are in direct receipt of Income Support or are disabled and in receipt of both Employment Support Allowance and Disability Living Allowance in their own name.

Students who are economically or socially disadvantaged and at risk of not taking up or continuing in their education.

Students who have been in care, on probation, are young parents or are otherwise considered at risk.

Students who are asylum seekers.

Students who are refugees (who will have access to 16-19 Bursary Funding if they are in receipt of supportive evidence from DWP).

Students who are lone parents

Who is not eligible for 16-19 Bursary Funding?

Students under 16 years of age or over 19 years of age on 31/08/19
Students who do not meet the residency qualifications.

How does the School assess applications and allocate 16-19 Bursary funding?

The 16-19 Bursary Fund is a limited fund and the school will prioritise applications. There will be 3 priority groups plus an exceptional help request, categorised as high, medium and low.

High priority group

Students in most need aged under 19 on 31/08/19 and who fall into one of the following categories:

Those who are currently in care (as defined by social services).

Those who are leaving or have recently left care.

Those who receive Income Support in their own name; or

Those who are disabled and receive both Employment Support Allowance **and** Disability Living Allowance.

Eligible students will be guaranteed a £1200 bursary plus support for other costs such as transport, equipment *etc.*

Payments will normally be made on a termly basis

Medium priority group

Students who fall into one or both of the following categories:

The student is eligible for a free school meal.

The student lives in a household where the parent(s)/carer(s) are in receipt of Income Support.

Eligible students in this group may apply to the 16–19 Bursary Fund for a contribution towards:

The cost of transport, essential course equipment, trips, uniforms, materials, exam re-sit fees, or other education-related costs.

Childcare costs (where the student is a parent).

This may be a one-off payment for specific items or a cash bursary for support up to a maximum of £1000, according to need. Amounts paid will be subject to the number of students in the category and the availability of funds.

Financial support is dependent on the student meeting agreed attendance and behaviour as specified in the Sixth Form Contract.

Low priority group

Students who fall into the following category:

Students who live in a household where the gross annual household income is less than £31,000

Those in the low priority group will be considered for financial support, subject to availability of funds, after those in the high and medium priority groups have been awarded. Students in this group may receive a **contribution** towards the cost of essential course equipment, transport costs or other expenses related to educational criteria.

Financial support is dependent on the student meeting agreed attendance and behaviour as specified in the Sixth Form Contract.

The awards will be dependent on good behaviour, adherence to the Sixth Form Contract and good attendance (no more than 10% unexplained absence from all lessons). Please note that the school has been allocated only £ 16,707.00 for this Bursary Scheme and that is to include administration.

Exceptional Help

Under exceptional circumstances, any students who are experiencing short-term financial hardship who are not automatically eligible for an award can also apply for help with one-off course related expenses (proof of income or hardship will be asked for). Applications for additional help will be considered on an individual basis and are dependent upon available funds.

What can the money be spent on?

The money is for the books, meals, transport or other course-related costs needed to help a young person stay in education.

If I am in one of the eligible groups what evidence will the school need to see? If you are receiving Income Support, Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance or an Income-related Employment and Support Allowance, you can provide a letter from the Department of Work and Pensions setting out the benefit you are entitled to. If you are in care or a care leaver, the local authority will be able to provide a letter for the school confirming this. If you have any other financial needs, you will need to show documentary evidence as to why you need financial support. For Low Priority bursary awards, evidence relating to household income will be required. The supporting evidence required is detailed under the relevant category on the application form.

Income Support

Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance

The guaranteed element of Pension Credit

Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)

Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

Universal Credit - if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

Requests for Transport Assistance

To be eligible to apply for financial help with transport costs from the 16-19 Bursary, you must provide evidence that you have already applied to Essex County Council for Post 16 Transport assistance and been unsuccessful.

How do I apply?

Application forms for the Autumn Term should be submitted to the Student Support Manager in the Sixth Form Office by no later than the 11 October 2019.

Use the Application Form attached to this policy. Remember to include income evidence to support your application. The evidence required is detailed under the relevant category on the application form.

What happens to my application form?

All applications will be considered by a **Bursary Remissions Panel**

The Bursary Remissions Panel will include the Head of Sixth Form, Deputy Head Teacher, the School Business Manager.

The Bursary Remissions will assess each claim and authorise payments. Payments will be made to students in November, February and June. Approved bursaries will be monitored and evaluated throughout the year and reports given to the Remissions Panel regarding students who fail to meet the conditions of the grant. The grant will be withdrawn at any time if a student fails to meet the criteria. In some circumstances, the school may choose to pay the bursary as a cash payment or for example purchasing equipment or a service on behalf of the eligible student

Advice on bank accounts?

Students aged 16 are able to open a basic bank account, which is offered by 16 members of the British Bankers Association. The basic bank account will allow for receipt of the bursary by cashless means and will allow funds to be withdrawn via ATMs as well as via standing orders and direct debits where necessary.

Where bursary payments are to be made to a bank account, they can only be made to the student's bank account.

Payments may not be made into another person's account, except in exceptional circumstances where a student is unable to administer their own account.

Payments may be made to a joint account, as long as the student is one of the account holders.

If a student has a Post Office account, it should be noted that these accounts do not accept payments by BACs (electronic bank transfers).

NB The bursary payment to schools is a fixed sum and not on a per student basis. Mayflower High School may vary the amounts of its bursaries to fairly reflect the number of eligible students in the Sixth Form.
